Dear B & M Fans:

The January meeting of the Society was attended by approximately 70 members and guests who once again had the opportunity of seeing more of Mr. Stan Whitney's B&M publicity movies that were made for television viewing in the early 1950's. Following this, Henry Marrec showed movies of the Erie-Lackawanna and the D&H that were taken last summer.

They are as follows: No. 202 - Daniel Webster; No. 205 - Hannah Dustin; No. 209 - Styles Bridges; and No. 210 - Franklin Pierce. The names are carried on the cabs under the windows.

Regarding the Snow Train article that appeared in the December 1973 B&M Bulletin, Mr. Elwin K. Heath, 21 Hilltop Avenue, Barre, Vermont 05641 sends us this nostalgia:

"This account of snow trains took place January 21, 1938, and I was aided by Mr. Laurence I. Beake in working this up and completing the account. I was on U.S. Highway 302 and Laurence was on one of the three snow trains from Boston to Fabyans that nice, sunny Sunday. I had to make a motor trip to Portland, Maine, returning on the 20th. and 21st., and it was on the return trip that I ran across these snow trains

climbing the mountain to Fabyans. I became interested in them and stopped in the "Notch" to watch them ascend that steep mountain. With information gained from Laurence, and from what I could get, this turned out to be a very interesting set-up of these three trains. All three trains changed engines at Dover and at Intervale, or Bartlett, as follows:

Boston-Dover:

Train A - 12 cars B&M 3703
" B - 10 cars " 3707
" C - 8 cars " 3678

Dover-Intervale:

Train A - 12 cars B&M 3652 & 3703
" B - 10 cars " 3678 & 3707
" C - 8 cars " 3701

Intervale-Fabyans:

Train A - 12 cars B&M 3652 & MeC 621

" B - 10 cars " 3678 & " 606

" C - 8 cars " 3703 & B&M 3707

As you will note the three B&M pacifics leaving Boston on these trains made the entiretrip through to The Fabyans. I stopped at The Fabyans and watched these trains turn on the wye and make-up for the return trip to Boston late that afternoon - a real sight to behold."
