Dear B & M Fans:

The May meeting of the Society was attended by approximately 100 members and guests who heard Mr. Alan Dustin, Executive Vice President of the Boston and Maine Corporation, speak on current operating procedures on the B&M Railroad. He also spoke about his former days with the D&H Railway and the BAR Railroad, and about the B&M's future with respect to viability and possible merger with other railroads. A question and answer period followed his most interesting talk. Mr. Charles Smith then showed a selection of slides of the B&M operations in the early 1950's. Coffee and doughnuts were served after the slide program.

The June meeting of the Society will be held at the First Unitarian Parish Church, corner of Winn and Pleasant Streets, Woburn Square, at 8:00 p.m. on Saturday, June 8, 1974. Mr. Don Valentine will present the entertainment that evening, which will consist of slides and movies of the Cass Scenic Railroad in Pocahontas County, West Virginia. This will be a good opportunity for those who can't get down to the Mountain State to see this fascinating operation.

The tour of the Billerica Shops was postponed to June 15 due to unforeseen circumstances. Those who were to have taken the tour on May 18 were notified of the change by special mailing. This will serve to notify those who have signed up for the tour that it will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, June 15. 
The B&M's Ione 44-tonner, No. 119, lives on. The latest report is that it is once again back in operation.

Parts are being taken from stripped S-2 No. 1265 to repair the 1274. S-2 No. 1262 is also at East Deerfield being stripped for scrap."
