Dear B&M Fans:

The April meeting of the Boston and Maine Railroad Historical Society will be a joint meeting with the Massachusetts Bay Railroad Enthusiasts, Inc., at the RRE's meeting place, the Newton Highlands Congregational Church, 54 Lincoln Avenue, Newton Highlands, Mass. The church is located 1 block west of the MBTA's Riverside Line stop at Newton Highlands. PLEASE NOTE; the time of the meeting will be 7:30 p.m. Entertainment for the evening will be presented by Mr. H. Arnold Wilder and Mr. Dana D. Goodwin, and will feature B&M steam, 1930-1960.

MAY MEETING: PLEASE NOTE; The May meeting will be held in North Adams, Mass., at the PRICE CHOPPER Supermarket, located on Route 2, State Road, about 2 miles West of downtown North Adams, near the FRIENDLY ice cream shop and only a few hundred feet from the B&M mainline. The time of the meeting will be 7:00 p.m., instead of 8:00 p.m., as we must vacate the hall above the supermarket by 10:00 p.m. To get into the hall, go in the main entrance of the market. Turn right and you will see a doorway and sign over a stairway. The hall is upstairs. After the regular monthly business meeting, Mr. Jack Armstrong will show some of his slides of trains in Western New England and New York State. It should also be noted that nominations for the upcoming elections of our various official positions take place at the May meeting, and anyone wishing to make a nomination from the floor should plan to attend.

MARCH MEETING: The regular monthly meeting of the B&MRRHS was called to order at 8:15 P.M. in the First Unitarian Parish Church, Woburn, Mass., by President Donald S. Robinson. There were approximately minety-five members and guests in attendance.

The Secretary's and the Treasurer's reports were accepted as read.

Business Manager John C. Hutchins iterated the announcement he had made at the previous month's meeting; effective April 1st, the price of the Society's Central Mass. book would increase by \$1.00, becoming \$6.00 to members and \$7.95 (plus 50¢ for postage) to non-members.

Publications Editor R. Richard Conard announced that the Spring issue of the "Bulletin" was scheduled for publication in mid-April.

Program Chairman Donald G. Hills spoke about the April meeting, which will be held jointly with the Massachusetts Bay Railroad Enthusiasts. It will take place at 7:30 P.M., Thursday, April 22nd, in the Newton Highlands Congregational Church, 54 Lincoln Avenue, Newton Highlands, Mass., and the program will be presented by Dana D. Goodwin and H. Arnold Wilder, who are members of both organisations.

President Robinson then introduced the well-known railway photographer John Krause, who was a guest at the meeting and noted the attendance at the meeting of member Bruce P. Curry,

of Ottawa.

The business meeting was adjourned at 8:25 P.M. Following the business meeting, member Kenneth E. Patton presented a slide program that illustrated a broad spectrum of railway operations, with the emphasis on New England lines.

NEWS AND OBSERVATIONS: The North Conway, NH Depot Model Railroad Club and Conway Scenic Railroad are jointly sponsoring the third annual nodel railroad open-house and exhibit to be held at the deop in North Conway, N.H. on Saturday, May 8, 1976. The hours are from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM. No admission fee will be charged, however, voluntary donations will be accepted at the door. All proceeds will go to the North Conway Depot Model Railroad Club to help finance their building projects.

The open house will feature static and operating model railroad exhibits, displays of railroadiana, and tours of the second floor room where the North Conway Depot Model Railroad Club will have their impressive HO layout in operation. Other exhibits will be set up inside antique rail cars of Conway Scenic Railroad, including a former Bangor & Aroostook cafe observation car built in

1894.


A food sale will be conducted at the depot, and Conway Scenic Railroad will be operating excursion trains to Conway and return at reduced fares of \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children 5 to 12. Under 5 are free. Trains will depart from North Conway at 11:00 AM, 1:00, 2:30 and 4:00 PM.

The Wolfeborough Railroad is running excursions on the ex-B&M Lincoln Branch from Concord to Lincoln and return each Sunday in April. Trains will leave Concord NH depaot at 8:30 AM and return about 5:30 PM. There will be a candy butcher on the train, but you are advised to bring-your own lunch, "litter bag and camera". Capacity limited to 140. Reservations must be made in advance, no passes. Tickets are \$15.00 for adults and \$8.00 for children 5 to 12. Send check and SSAE to Wolfeboro Railroad Co., Dept 2, Wolfeboro, NH 03894. Specify date and alternate dates.

On March 2, 1976, B&M freight SJ-1 stuck an oil trouk at Bellows Falls at the crossing just south of the Bellows Falls tunnel, demolishing the empty oil truck and stuffing the remains of it into the mouth of the tunnel. The cab of lead unit 1726 was badly damaged, although there were no serious injuries.

On March 15, 1976, local freight B-43 reported by radio that two cars and the caboose with the conductor and flagman aboard had derailed and rolled down the embankment behind the Mass. Broken Stone Facillities west of the Fitchburg Division overpass in Weston. The conductor was unhurt, although the flagman was taken to a hospital and treated for a sore back. One carload of lumber and the caboose were later rerailed on March 19th, with the aid of the company bulldozer and the Boston wrecker. The remaining car was split wide open in the derailment and will be scrapped on the spot.

Today (April 1st) is the beginning of ConRail, and it has already brought about some changes on the B&M. Freights RW-1 and WR-2 nicknamed the "Maine Bullets" years ago, have been abolished, due to ConRail abolishing the interchange point of Worcester with the B&M. This leaves the Worcester-Ayer just a one local freight a day brach. Also, B&M will shortly take over operations of the ex PC Framingham-Lowell line, from Lowell to South Sudbury.

MORE NEWS: Also with the coming of the first of April, passenger train sevice to Newburyport was discontinued, and on Monday, April 5, 1976, No. 108 and No. 133, the weekday train to Haverhill, Mass., will no longer make any stops in Andover.
