Dear B&M fans:

The October meeting of the Boston & Maine Railroad Historical Society will be held on Saturday October 9 at 8:00 PM in the Unitarian Church on Woburn Square. This will be a members night, and each is asked to bring a few slides for showing.

As the program chairman is on vacation in Colorado no announcement is available for the November meeting. The date, however, is the 13th; same time, same station.

MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 11th, 1976: The regular monthly meeting of the B&MRRHS was called to order at 8:15 PM in the First Unitarian Parish Church, Woburn, Mass., by Vice President Leroy C. Hutchinson. Approximately 65 members and guests were in attendance.

The Secretary's and Treasurer's reports were accepted as read.

The Secretary apologized for the lateness of the most recent issue of the "Newsletter", which was the result of unexpected delays concomitant with the changes being effected in the publication's staff.

Publications Editor R. Richard Conard announced that the fall issue of the "Bulletin" should be ready within about a month and will contain the continuation of the Post 1911 B&M Steam Roster prepared by Lester S. Twombly and Robert E. Chaffin.

Member John C. Alden spoke about the B&M's Bicentennial Train, which will be on display at North Station, Boston, on September 24th. The exhibits will be staffed by B&MRRHS personnel.

Member David K. Johnson announced that the Hancock (NH) Historical Society was seeking old photographs of the railroad station in that town.

Program Chairman Donald G. Hills asked members who would like to present programs at meetings to contact him through the Society's Reading address. He also requested that members let him know of their preferences in programs to help guide him in arranging entertainment for future meetings.

The business meeting was adjourned at 8:40 PM.

Following the business meeting, member Russell F. Munroe, Jr., presented a slide program of railroading in New England and Canada from the 1950's to the present time, with B&M steam operations featured in the earlier photographs.

NEWS AND COMMENT: Items of a newsworthy nature have been few and far between in the past month. Below are those that have come to the attention of the editor.

After having been slightly damaged by hitting a boulder left on the track in Gloucester, the Fiat railcar has been operating in revenue service. The first runs were on the Eastern Route and more recently it has been on the Reading line. It also spent one day abuttling between Lincoln and South Acton in connection with West Concord's "Junction Function". Following service on the Lowell and South Acton lines it is expected that the car will be turned over to ConRail for experimental operation on the Needham Branch. Only non-rush hour service is possible as the car can not MU with other equipment.

A strike on the Halifax docks has caused the rerouting of containers shipments with three special trains of over fifty cars each being routed over the Northern Railroad of New Hampshire. Normal service is three or four trains a week from Concord to Penacook; Penacook-Gale sees one train (usually Tuesdays) as far as needed; there is no running to Lebanon from Gale. A switcher comes down from White River to Lebanon as needed. A far cry from the old days!

On September 8 there was a head-on collision between the E-7 local and a Green Mountain work train in Bellows Falls. Both B&M 1221 and GM 303 were derailed and damaged, the latter extensively, but fortunately there were no serious injuries to personnel. While the results of the investigation, held September 17, have not been announced at this writing, the accident occurred on Green Mountain track 600 feet north of the yard limit sign where the B&M has no authority to operate. In addition, the conductor of the local had been informed by the GM train dispatcher that the work train had left Chester and had been instructed to provide flag protection. The Green Mountain men, however, stated that they saw no flag and were first aware of the presence of the B&M train when they came in sight of the engine less than 400 feet from the collision point. Only the slow speed of both trains prevented a more serious accident. As the printing of personal speculations concerning responsibility were improper we will withhold further comment until the results of the investigation are released.
