Each month we report on your Society's projects and activities, and we try to give you an idea of what's happening on our namesake railroad. COMMUTER COMMENTS—Yes, the special train to Concord NH did run on May 5th, B&Matters leaving Boston at 1PM and Concord at 4:30PM, and was enthusiastically received by all in New Hampshire—and in Massachusetts. Everyone was in good spirits and good will flowed from the assembled officials and politicians. F40PH #1009 and 4 Pullman-Standard push-pull cars did the honors. The day before a test train was run on the same route with B&M and MBTA officials on board; that time F10 #1103 was used with the Pullman-Standard cars. (Suncook Valley RR HS Newsletter)

The Pullman-Standard push-pull coaches now being built for the MBTA will, along with Amtrak's Superliners, be the last passenger cars built by Pullman. Pullman is quitting the passenger car business

after those two orders are completed.

The Kendall Green Depot has been saved, Warren Vittum writes. Weston has approved the zoning by-laws changes to allow professional offices in the two town RR stations; as part of the arrangement a suitable waiting room will be provided at Kendall Green.

Commuter Equipment Notes — F10 deliveries stand at 9: units 1100-04 (Head end power) and 1150-53 (steam generator) are in service. The 4200 series E8's have been withdrawn from service for the summer. three sets of GO coaches are running; one each to Framingham, Reading, and Woburn. (Narragansett Newsletter) One of the GO coaches damaged in the Barton VT wreck on April 7 was cut up on the spot..

The Tender Offer is finally ON! The offer commenced May 3rd and will expire June 1st unless extended. A large ad was run in the Wall St. Journal announcing the offer and giving procedural details. The offer is for \$37 million principal amount of the series TT 6% bonds due 1970; price is \$80 per \$100 principal, with all interest waived. How is it progressing? Very well: the trustees announced that as of close of business May 18 bonds totalling \$24,590,500 had been tendered for purchase.

B&M GETS GOLD! The Boston & Maine has been awarded the Harriman Gold Medal for the best safety record among Class B railroads (5-20 million employee-hours worked annually). This award marks the fulfillment of a concentrated effort by all B&M personnel to reduce employee injuries. In 1972 the B&M safety record was the poorest of the 15 railroads in its class, but concentrated efforts have improved that record tremendously. The result is something every B&M'er can be prout of.

EARNINGS: The B&M's trustees have announced the B&M's first quarter 1979 railroad-only earn-

EARNINGS: The B&M's trustees have announced the B&M's first quarter 1979 railroad-only earnings on an ICC basis. Net loss of \$1,220,958 on revenues of \$25,152,964; 1st quarter 1978 figures were net loss of \$2,846,816 on \$21,026,477 of revenues. March 1979 showed net income of \$168,472; much better than March 1978's \$332,086 net loss.

Furthermore, the trustees have released the 1978 Consolidated Earnings; the figures include subsidiaries and leased lines, and also reflect favorable back tax settlements and settlement of a collateral loan. These audited figures are better than the initial figures in the ICC report released in Feb. The figures: (1977 in "()") On a Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) basis consolidated revenues were \$93,256,000 (\$88,563,000) with a net loss of only \$840,000 (\$4,421,000)! On a railroad-only ICC basis with revenues of \$91,489,652 (\$87,930,931) the net loss was only \$540,000 (\$5,654,394)!!

Sad News: It was reported at the May 3rd Thursday meeting of the Mass Bay RRE that the Wolfeborough Railroad is expected to file for complete abandonment shortly. Supposedly notices of the intent to abandon have already been posted.

SYMBOL CHANGES: NY-10 & BM-7 cut back to Mc'ville, NY-10 lv. Mc'ville 0700; NY-10 & BM-7 now functions as a turnaround job.

Montrealer: still no final word; proposals to retain it and several other Amtrak trains are wending their way through Congress. It is nip and tuck; most observers feel that while the Montrealer is close to survival it is not yet out of danger.
