50 YEARS AGO (in June 1981 Newsletter).

25 YEARS AGO - July-August, 1956, Vol. 24, No. 4 - Front Cover shows new box cars in yard 9, E. Somerville, MA; cars part of an order of 1,000 with new B&M insignia...50-ton capacity, photo by Frank H. Hill. "Rewards a True 'Rail'"...photo of member Bill Patton, Adv. Man., receiving watch from President P. B. McGinnis, in connection with reporting a broken rail on the Cen. Mass. line near Waltham. From 'High Green' more than 17,000 campers were handled during the week of July 4th; 20 trains thru Worcester, 6 out of Springfield, to Maine and New Hampshire. During this same time, 9 special trains were operated to Camp Drum, NY, 6 from Boston, 2 from Malden, 1 from Waltham. R.R. Enthusiasts ran special train to Weirs, NH, 460 passengers enjoyed 4-hour cruise on S.S. Mt. Washington around Lake Winnepeasaukee, before returning to Boston via the Woburn Loop. Engine No. 494 owned by R.E.I. is being placed next to the municipal building, Town of Hartland, VT (W. R. Jct.) Photo story showing Pacific type 4-6-2 (p. 2) supplying steam for Mystic Pier. Oldest Active Employee - photo showing G. R. Ferguson, Chief of Pass. Bureau, with 66 years of service, since Oct. 2, 1916 when it was started. Personnel changes: I. W. Clifford appointed Div. Supt., Fitch. Div.; photo of Tracey R. Quick, retired as Supt., with V.P. F. W. Rourke, and F. Reynolds. Photo of Cond. Jack Sears presented with watch by Howard Evans, G. N. Ry. Sears had 53 years service. Also, retired, K. M. Qua, Gen. Claim Agent. Photo of veterans at Old Timers Night at Concord, NH including W. F. 'Windy' Carroll, former Pass. Cond. on train #307.

"The B&M has a 'potential of being a very good investment" said Mr. Raymond; is willing to pay more than Mr. Mellon who is also interested in acquiring the M.E.C. from U.S. Filter Corp., possibly building a New England Railway System (see p. 4).

Caterpillars caused freight trains to stall in Westminster, MA - front-page news - Boston Herald - 6/6/81 (thanks to H. B. Crouch and Bill Hellmann).

Debris cleaned up from derailed train - Boston Herald - 6/15/81 - Several cars "off the iron", train headed to Lawrence, MA; 2 fishermen nearby; going over Conn. River bridge, east of East Deerfield yards.

"Train derails in Wakefield" - Med. Mercury - 5/21/81 - Photo showing loco. and 2 cars "on the ground"; same photo in N.Y. Times 5/22/81 (W. E. Lenk). Also, postcard from Don LeJeune indicates loco. 1721 on 14:59 Salem switcher.

"Officials Await Rail Trestle Funds" - Manchester, NH Union - 6/3/81 by Carol McCormick. "NHTA is waiting for funding" to replace R.R. trestle over the Stony Brook, west of Lyndeborough, NH (Keene Branch) built in 1883; cars going to Greenfield and Bennington, NH involved. (David K. Johnson)

5/19 - Power leaving Salem SAED GP-9's 1717, 1709; 5/20 - GP-9's 1733, 1747. \*\*\* Power idling at Lawrence on 5/24 were the 800, 801, 1222. Power idling at Boston yard 7: GP-7 1576, Geep-9's 1724, 1707; MU'd were 1717, 1729 (new paint scheme), and the 1749. Parked adjacent to the yard office was the 806. Down next to the Yard 8 office were the 1223, 1123. \*\*\* The following engines have been spotted with the "Bad Paint Syndrome" which is a darker blue that has chipped, peeled, and faded very rapidly. Those are the 1709, 1724, 1748, 1754. \*\*\* Those remaining yard switchers still in their original paint colors can be still seen working the East and West Yards at E. Deerfield. It should be noted that I'm sure that there may be other locations that these switchers in the old colors are working, but they will all be seeing the spray gun sooner or later...most likely sooner. \*\*\* Power for SAED on 5/25: GP-9 1744, GP-18 1752. The 1459 switcher job out of Salem has had the 1730 (Minuteman nose) GP-9, for the last 5 days. \*\*\* Power heading West from SAED on 5/29: GP-18 1750, GP-9 1745; 5/26 GP-18 1826 used as the 1459 switcher job out of Salem; 5/31 GP-9's 1744, 1706, GP-7 1571, GP-18 1750 brought in as the 1459 switcher. 6/1 GP-18 1755, GP-9 1711. 6/2 GP-18 1751, GP-9 1709. 6/3 GP-9's 1744, 1706. 6/3 GP-7 1571 came up from Boston to Salem as the Boston switcher working Lynn. 6/4 GP-9's 1741, 1709. On 6/6 welded rail will be placed on the Gloucester Branch that has been worked on for over a year now. \*\*\* 6/5 SAED power: GP-9 1730, GP-18 1751, GP-9 1706. 6/6 GP-7's 1573, 1572. 6/8 GP-9's 1744, 1718. 6/9 GP-9's 1727, 1717. 6/10 1748, 1730. Boston switcher working up to Salem GP-7 1563. \*\*\* The crossover on the westbound side of the "Lynn Middle" at West Lynn was removed the week of June 7th. It's been learned that eventually the "Middle" track that's served E. & W. bound trains for longer than I can remember will be taken out permanently. 6/11 - I've obtained the latest revised freight schedule for you. Please note some changes that I've received as far as some runs abolished, as well as the Telegraph Bulletin of 6/5 concerning Mech'vlle, and SAED Salem end. This end was abolished because they just couldn't get the crews to take it, most of the members didn't like the day layover at E. Dfld. OS-1 cancelled as of 6/6, as well as BOSO SOBO, and has gone back to DO-1, DO-2 BODO, DOBO. This end picked up LAME-A, LAME-B again. \*\*\* In response to John Beebe's question of 5/11/81 concerning "S" shaped pieces of metal in the ends of the ties, they're put there to prevent the tie from splitting at the ends, they were used way back when...and are still used now on selected ties. \*\*\* The reason that the B&M cabooses are going from the "C-66" to a three digit number series is that the computers cannot read out just two numbers and a letter; eventually all the buggy's will be changed over...modelers take note... \*\*\* From Billerica: GP-18 1821 damaged in Wakefield last month will leave the shops in July. GP-18 1803 leaves the shops today after a rebuild

and paint 6/11/81. The shops are currently working on two Toronto GO cars damaged; when repaired, will return to Canada. GP-9 1743 scheduled for extensive work will leave in the latter part of this year. GP-40-2 313 will be painted in IMRON and should be put into revenue by the end of June. GP-9's 1700, 1734 remain stored at Billerica. The LRV still is at Billerica - disposition unknown. \*\*\* NOTE to Don Provencher: Contact Mr. Richard Muehlke, Director, Purchasing & Stores, Iron Horse Park, N. Billerica, MA. #### 14L NOTES FROM A SONIC VANTAGE POINT by Don Tead, Parker St., S. Acton, MA

Most adults and many children know the song, "Listen to the Mockingbird, listen to the Mockingbird...". My friend started at 4:45 this morning (Sunday, June 7th) with his endless variations and chatter and sings on and on and on. Through the end of July my train tapes recorded during the day (and night if my voluble friend decides to serenade the moon) will have the mockingbird in the background. He seems to have picked up the call of a whippoorwill during his winter sojourn somewhere but it is not one of his best imitations. My collection includes about 130 steam locomotive records and there are a few passages where, according to the notes or narration, the engineers "whip-poor-will" the whistles. I know the call of the whippoorwill well but have never been able to recognize it in steam. A fortuitous reference to my 1947 copy of Peterson's "A Field Guide to the Birds" (published by Houghton-Mifflin) one day explains my inability. Southerners call the chuck-will's-widow a whippoorwill. The cww is a relative of the wpw and has a different call (which I have heard only once while on a "night problem" in Alabama in WW II). I never considered the locomotive whistle a toy to imitate a whippoorwill but at least it is not in the category of that insufferable "Shave and a haircut..." which I have heard many times on locomotive whistles and horns, boat whistles and a myriad of times on automobile horns! The sound of a good Nathan M-3 has been heard here since May 21 intermittently. I was a bit puzzled initially as I knew that 1572 - also with a good M-3 - had been returned to the B&M. The Leslie S-5TR on 1110 was damaged months ago so the MBTA borrowed a horn from the B&M. Incidentally, I believe that May 21 was the first time that 1110 appeared on the S. Acton line. All the 1000's and 1100's except one are now "in the can" (taped).

NEWS RELEASE dated May 6, 1981 from New England (Railroad) Labor/Management Task Force, 242 St. John St., Portland, ME 04102 - "Portland, Maine...In an innovative approach, New England railroads and labor organizations have recently formed a Labor/Management Task Force. Fifteen rail labor organizations and ten New England railroads have agreed to participate in this joint effort to bring together on a regular basis, the people involved in providing rail service in the region. According to a spokesman for the Task Force, 'The objectives of the Task Force are to improve rail service in the region through experiments which enhance railroad profitability, stabilize and improve the quality of railroad employment, explore opportunities to augment the rail traffic base, and increase the awareness of Federal and State policy makers of the impact of their decisions on rail service in the region'...."

Letter from 0. A. KENYON, Treasurer, Central NY Chapter, National Railway Historical Society, Inc., 5/21/81 - "On reading my first Newsletter, May issue, page two, I found several members noticed the absence of F unit 4265A and wondered where it might be. I can enlighten you on its whereabouts. The Central New York Chapter of National Railway Historical Society, Inc., Syracuse, NY, purchased this engine December 23, 1980 and it was delivered on March 13th to the New York State Fair siding to become a part of the above Chapter's railroad museum. Our members have already started refurbishing the outside of the engine back to its original maroon and yellow colors as a static exhibit. President Alan Dustin spoke at our yearly banquet and dedicated the engine on April 11th and 12th, 1981. Being at the New York State Fair grounds it becomes a free fair exhibit the last of each August through Labor Day for some 800,000 people who attend. If any of the B&M membership are ever in the Syracuse area, the fair grounds are always open - exit Thruway 39 take 690 south about three miles right past the main entrance. The railroad exhibit is straight back from the main gate. I would be happy to keep you posted of the F No. 4265A in the future.

Also, the Com. of Penn. is making a half a million grant to D & H. N.Y. State assistance will involve purchase of 200 box cars and related repair contract - more work for the Oneonta car shops.
